A Childhood Memory Of Christmas by Beryl.

It is December 1963, and I am five years old and Mum is taking me to meet Father Christmas for the first time. We are going to Exeter to see him in the departmental store that was in the High Street called Waltons. Travelling from our farm at Highampton to Exeter in those days was a "big day out". We set off early because it would take us over an hour and a half to get to Exeter. We eventually arrived and decided to go direct to Waltons. We had to queue and eventually after walking through the Christmas displays it was my turn to see Father Christmas. His first comment was "Would you like to sit on my knee little girl?" "No" was my reply - I was very shy in those days. "Ok I hear you have been a good girl so what would you like for Christmas" asked Father Christmas. I replied "Please can I have a colouring and puzzle books, crayons, reading books and a doll with a pram. Father Christmas then gave me a small gift and off we went. It was lunchtime so Mum said, "Let's go to the British Home Stores restaurant and have fish and chips". Wow! A treat indeed. In those days eating out did not happen very often.

Mum and I spent the afternoon Christmas shopping and travelled home during the late afternoon.

In the evening I became quiet, and Mum soon asked me if anything was troubling me. I did not reply and promptly burst into tears. "Whatever is the matter dear" Mum said. I replied with tears running down my face that I was frightened and did not want any strange man coming into my bedroom leaving my Christmas presents.

At this point Mum found it difficult to keep a straight face and had to think quick on how to answer my concerns.



"I know" she said. "We will leave a note for Father Christmas asking him to leave your presents underneath the Christmas tree in the front room. I sure it will not be a problem". My tears soon stopped, and I felt relieved.

Christmas Eve arrives and we write the note and left it on the mantelpiece by the chimney so that Father Christmas would read it. Two chocolate biscuits were left in case he was feeling peckish. Everything went to plan and when I woke up in the morning, I found my presents had been left by the Christmas Tree.

When I was older my Mum would often love to remind me of the time that I did not want a strange man in my bedroom, and we had a good laugh. This is a childhood memory I never will forget.


